COMMODORE REPORT Jeremy Haydock

Happy New Year Shipmates!!

Wow, that was a fast year. It was a busy year here at the club. Life at the club returned to pretty much a normal pace, with lots of events each month and numerous things happening in, on, and around the club.

This year, we are setting up an even busier year with more events planned throughout the year. If you have not already noticed, we are now posting more regularly on Facebook for our larger events, and we will continue to do so. We will also be sending out more emails to our members as reminders for upcoming events. These events are also posted on the bulletin board at the club as well for those who do not regularly read their emails.

January is usually a slower month, but we still have quite a bit going on. Our first race of the new year will be on Saturday, Jan 7th. Start time is 1:00 pm, so be here around noon to help your skippers and crewmates get our boats ready after what for most, has been a long period of slumber. Our last race was rained out in December!

Our big event for the month will be our famous Lobster Boil on Saturday, January 14th. Stay tuned for more details which we will send out via email, Facebook, and posting at the club.

Also happening: Our illustrious cruise director Noble Brown will be giving a cruise out talk on Wednesday night, January 25th, so if you are interested in attending cruises, this is a great opportunity to learn more about how fun they are. This is an area we really need more participation, as the main core group of cruisers has mostly retired from cruising. If we want to continue this awesome program, we will need a lot more participation from our members. Trust me, you won't want to miss these events, they are amazing, fun, and informative. What better way to learn about the local waters and see other clubs all over the bay and delta and the down the California coast?

On Saturday, January 28th, we will put on a Hootenanny. Bring your musical instruments and talents, and we might even do some karaoke!

Now for business. As many of you might know, the California Alcohol Beverage Control board (ABC) has instituted new rules for any entity that serves alcohol. Any person who serves alcohol is now required to be a certified server and must take an online course and pass a 50-question test. The program is called the Responsible Beverage Server program (RBS). This rule applies to our honor bar as well. What this means for our club is that any member who wishes to use the honor bar and pour themselves or others a drink must be RBS certified with a server ID. Members who do not have this RBS certification with a server ID will be allowed to serve themselves or others at the honor bar. Failure to comply with this new law will result in the club losing its liquor license which would be a huge blow to us all.

There is a list at the bar showing all the members who have taken the test and are now RBS certified with a server ID. These are the only people allowed behind the bar to serve themselves or others. YOU MUST BE WEARING YOUR NAME TAG TO GO BEHIND THE BAR. As more members go through the program and pass the test and get their certificates, more members' names will be added to the list. The goal is to get as many members certified as possible so that we comply with the rule.

We held two different training sessions on Wednesday nights in November, and many members attended and registered for the course, registered with the ABC. Many have taken the online course, taken the ABC test, and passed the test to be certified. Moving forward, we will be doing one of these training sessions one Wednesday night per month to help facilitate our members getting certified. The cost for the certification and the online training is less than \$20. The club can credit your account for the fees once you have passed the test and have a server ID. We will send out an email to the membership when the next Wednesday training session will be. It will also be posted on the bulletin board.

Recreational Boaters of California (RBOC):

RBOC issued a call to action opposing the Delta Conveyance Project (the Tunnel Project). RBOC opposes the Project that would negatively impact the ability of the recreational boating public to navigate in the waterways of the Sacramento/San Joaquin Delta for the 14-year-long duration of the project construction.

There is a potential for the project to significantly increase the transport of invasive species into the Delta waterways, and to exacerbate the occurrence of harmful algal blooms. These reduce recreational opportunities on the waterways and already impose significant costs on the boating community.

While the project might enhance the availability of fresh water for transport out of the Delta, the \$14 billion expenditure would hasten the demise of aquatic

conditions in the Delta as climate change occurs. The foreseeable impacts include higher air temperatures, varying seasonality of inflows, fluctuations in wet weather periods as well as droughts, decreased snowmelt, increased risk of wildfires, saltwater intrusion further into the Delta, higher sea levels, and decreased water quality, especially during droughts.

However, the draft environmental impact analysis inadequately analyses these future risks. It unrealistically limits the future conditions only to the year 2040 for the evaluation of the climate as well as social impacts. It also fails to either disclose or evaluate numerous uncertainties, unknowns, and assumptions associated with the project.

On the contrary, the laws, policies, and projects that are already in place including water conservation, recycling, groundwater recovery, desalination plants, surface water storage, and groundwater management, support a No Project Alternative.

RBOC remains concerned that this project creates no new sources of water to address the impacts of drought, climate change, and population growth. The primary emphasis is to move high-quality water from the Delta, which would leave poor-quality water for the inhabitant fish species, wildlife, and humans. The project does not restore and protect the Delta and its ecosystems. The mitigations are weak to non-existent and in many instances, impacts are mischaracterized as 'Less Than Significant' (LTS) to 'No Impact' (NI).

In summary, the key concerns are:

- Disruption to navigable waters in the Delta for 14 years during construction
- Does not adequately address climate change and its impacts on decreased snow melt
- Unquantified Groundwater Impacts (for Example Table 8.0) nonmeaningful LTS
- Does not create any new sources of water
- Will wreak havoc on the aquatic species, wildlife, inhabitants, recreational users and supporting industries

HOW THE STRAITS HAVE CHANGED

The boat in this photo is a Sun class, which was very similar to a Snipe class of today. It was owned and sailed by my dad, Ralph, and his twin brother Bob. This photo was taken at the opening of the Carquinez straits in about 1944.

As you can see, there are a lot of things that have changed, like only one bridge and a lighthouse building, both of which are not there anymore. The bridge over the Carquinez straits was built in 1927 and removed in about 2003 due to seismic considerations. The parallel bridge was built in about 1957 and serves as the northbound route across the straits. Both of these bridges are cantilever bridges. The newer one, a suspension

bridge, was built about 2003, and the old bridge was removed. At that time, a caisson was built around the bridge, and the existing buoy we race around today was installed. Not many of us around here remember racing around the entire abutment, which is the subject of some great stories.

The original span opened about 1927 and connected San Francisco to Sacramento. It was privately run, and tolls were charged. When the bridge was built, it became part of the Lincoln Highway, the first transcontinental highway. This was renumbered to US 40, and when the interstate system came about in the mid-'50s, it was renumbered Interstate 80. There were several realignments in the meantime. These bridges are vital to our history, as we are closely linked to the military with transportation to and from the area.

The other big change was removing the lighthouse at the Vallejo side of the channel. The light was commissioned in 1910 and deactivated in 1951. This building was lifted, moved, and is now the office at the Glen Cove marina, which is actually located in Elliott Cove. In 1955, when it was moved, my dad took me to Carquinez Heights to watch it being lifted and sailed under the Carquinez Bridge. As a 6 yr old, I was absolutely amazed at this process and even more amazed that dad and half the yacht club knew this was happening.

Getting back to the boat, if you notice, the registration letters are quite large. As the country was at war, the letters were large to identify pleasure boats. I personally don't think that boat would be much pleasure in the straits on a Wednesday night race. Boats of that day were all wood, and most of them are not around anymore, nor are the characters who sailed them. And there were some characters in the midst. When you go out the next time, think and imagine, all the things that have changed, from Jack London's time at our club until today.
