



The Napa Delta

North and west of the Sears Point bridge, HI way 37, there is a menagerie of waterways and islands that make up the North Bay wetlands.

There are about 12 major islands that make up this area that were greatly changed by the hydraulic mining practices during the gold rush era and the slitting that has occurred both during and since. The flow of the Sacramento River slowed, causing, among other things, immense silting in the San Francisco Bay and attached waterways.

San Pablo Bay, which is known as the largest wetland area on the west coast, is an area where fresh, and saltwater meet and form the brackish water that is In our area. This water also contains a lot of silt and heavy metals that have resulted from these mining interests, and practices.

In the time of the old clipper ships of the 19th century, this was becoming a concern as the ships had to go as far as Angel Island to resupply with fresh water for their return trip to the east coast, or to the West Indies, and other trading destinations. This was commonly done just before a person was captured and indentured on a vessel as it was not easy to get anyone to volunteer to man these ships, and captains paid handsomely for the seaman-to-be.

Point here, is the practice of hydraulic mining has had a significant effect on the environment and commerce of the Bay. Diverting of the freshwater to other areas, like the central valley and south, has caused our fresh water to become brackish sometimes as far as Antioch. That is a reason why we have the thick bay mud that abounds.

The major islands in the area are Knight Island Sonoma which is north of the Dutchman Slough, which you can see when crossing the Sears Point bridge if you are otherwise not paying attention to your driving. Cross Island is along 37 on the north until you get to island #4, which ends at the Skaggs Island Road where Little Napa Slough is. Skaggs Island continues to Sonoma Creek. This was a ferry route to the city of Sonoma till about the late part of the 1800s when the railroad bridge and tracks were built, as the water had gotten so silted due to the upstream issues.

Tubbs Island starts and continues to almost the intersection of Highway 121 toward Sonoma and other points north. The railroad tracks there are technically open but I would like to see them used just to watch the traffic jam on Highway 37.

North and west are two islands, camp #2, and camp #3. Wingo, which is a ghost town on the rail lines, was built at the bridge crossing of Sonoma Creek and connected with the Ferry. The rail line continues, north to Sonoma, and south to Marin County and points north and south from there. Some of the buildings are still standing, but good luck getting into them as they are at a point of worse-than-arrested decay. This is, more than likely, the rail line that author Jack

London probably used to get to his boat when he was a member of the Vallejo Yacht Club, and kept his boat there.

Retreating back to the Napa River, north of Knight Island, is South Slough, where Russ Island borders the Napa River. Along the north of South Slough is Banty Island, which is separated from Island #2 by Devil's Slough. In this area is Island #5, which is separated from the others by Napa Slough, which flows to the Napa River south of Edgerly Island. North of this and adjacent to Edgerly Island, is Coon Island, which has a public access point.

Now if you think that this is confusing, you should have tried to write it!

The entire bay ecosystem started at about 720 sq. miles, and due to the intervention, thus, has shrunk to about 480 sq. miles. Land trusts have been established to retake and preserve the wetlands and bring the area back, as well as we can, to the wildlife area it was.

Islands are being reclaimed and filled in with bay dredging spoils. So now that you have the verbal tour of the Napa River delta, as I call it, and are thoroughly confused about how did it got here! Well, at one time, Highway 37 was a toll road. It was the Carquinez Bridge of the north, allowing traffic and commerce from the east to the west.

During the gold rush era, dikes were built and it was found that there was some very rich soil under the surface. These dikes created islands that were eventually drained and turned into very viable farmlands.

In the case of the Napa River, Mare Island was established in about 1854.

As there were no automobiles, the transportation method was the horse, or hay burners as they were referred. This area was close to the island and diked off to create farmlands. The area grew a lot of grain, but most of it was hay, for feeding the horses. The area, as did others that started making money, was developed, and the farming of the area flourished for many years. When the internal combustion area put an end to the horse, the hay in the area lost its value. The islands remained, and until recently, with the efforts of those restoring the bay, will eventually go away.

The dikes are being breached to allow them to flood. This started about 30 years ago and continues today. I have personally witnessed the demise of the waterfowl in the area. The Pacific flyway has shifted east, down the central valley in the past years, and it recently is returning to the original areas, like the middle parts of the Bay area, and Sacramento/San Joaquin delta areas. That shift is great to see. It is thought that through the conservation and reclaiming of this area would contribute not only to the restoration of the Bay but also to the flyways.

I hope it works.


